- It allows to:
 - Record our voice on the video
 - Add audio notes to the video
 - Add questions/text/links to the video





edPuzzle - Steps

- Find, upload or create a video (YouTube, Vimeo and more)
- 2. Stop the video at different points and insert your questions, audio, text and links
- 3. Share that lesson with a class and get your students registered by using a "class code"
- 4. Review student participation and answers
- 5. Grade open-ended questions
